TELEGRAPH HEIGHTS STREETS ARE NAMED IN HONOUR OF TOWN OF BATTLEFORD PROMINENT CITIZENS

WILLIAM PARKER: Inspector, Reg #28, 205, 252
 b. 15 August 1853, d. 16 May 1945
 The early years in Battleford saw William and his brother, Harry (who later became Sheriff at Battleford) and another brother, Sub-Constable Julius Foster Dyke Parker (later Rev. Dyke Parker) play major rolls in the early development of Battleford.

JAMES WALKER: Superintendent (Colonel) Reg. #0.18
 b. 14 April 1846, d. 31 March 1935
 C.O. at Battleford in 1876. Took part with signing of Treaty Six at Fort Carlton – 24 December 1876.

SIR SAMUEL BENFIELD STEELE, K.C.M.G. CB, MVO Reg. #3 & 6 Superintendent
 b. 5 January 1849, d. 30 January 1919
 C.O. at Battleford December 1885 to September 1886.

ALBERT CHAMPAGNE, Reg. #1488
 b. 5 June 1866, D. 12 October 1937
 Battleford's first Mayor when Battleford became a Town on the 15 June 1904. He then became Battleford's first M.L.A. when Saskatchewan became a Province in 1905. In 1908, he was elected Member of Parliament and served in the Dominion House until the dissolution of the 12th Parliament.

JOSEPH HOWE, Superintendent, Reg #339 - 0.48
 b. 5 September 1855, d. 17 August 1902
 C.O. at Battleford February, 1888 to May 1889.

SIR ARCHIBALD CAMERON MACDONELL, K.C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., LL.D. Lieut-General, Canadian Army, Superintendent, Reg. No. 0.95
 b. 6 October 1864, d. 23 December 1941
 C.O. at Fort Battleford from January 1905 to April 1906.
